

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The Nicol-Brown committee welcomes the judges for 2018:

Nancy Tunnicliffe and Eric Ouellette

ANCY TUNNICLIFFE is a full-time professional piper, teacher, and certified adjudicator of all levels of piping. Her special love is piobaireachd, taught in traditional vocal style and she also instructs all levels of light music.

As an amateur competitor, Nancy was the first winner of the prestigious Nicol-Brown Chalice for Piobaireachd, and as a professional competitor was consistently ranked in the top ten in the EUSPBA, winning many major contests. She has 40 years experience in teaching, and her students have been successful at all levels of competition.

Nancy also has experience in playing the pipes outside traditional venues, having performed as a soloist over 100 times with many of the country's leading orchestras. Highlights include the Boston Pops at Symphony Hall and Tanglewood, the National Symphony at Carnegie Hall, and the American Symphony at the Kennedy Center. She also toured the US several times as a spokesperson for the Scotch whisky industry.

RIC OUELLETTE began playing pipes 20 years ago under the tutelage of his uncle, Don Dixon. Shortly thereafter, he learned from Mike MacNintch, and later Chuck Murdoch and Nancy Tunnicliffe while progressing through the amateur solo grades in the eastern US. After a successful rise through the amateur grades, a keystone of which was winning the Nicol-Brown Chalice for Piobaireachd in 2004, he was promoted to the professional grade at age 16 that fall. Since that time, he has accrued numerous prizes across the east coast of the US, as well as in Canada and Scotland. Some of his most notable successes in Scotland to date have included winning the B Strathspey and Reel at the Argyllshire Gathering in

2014, the overall Champion Piper at Blairgowrie in 2015, 2nd Place in the Strathspey and Reel at Braemar in 2015, the overall Champion Piper at the Lonach Gathering in 2015 (including first for the unique "Willie Grant tune" event), as well as a three-year consecutive win streak of the B Piobaireachd at the Perth Highland Games from 2013-2015, among numerous other prizes around the local games circuit.



More recently, after completing his Ph.D. in 2016, Eric has begun a career as a biomedical engineering consultant for Exponent Failure Analysis Associates, and currently resides in Philadelphia. Though his solo activity during this time has been more quiet, he has remained active in band playing. Following many years in the Manchester Pipe Band (1998-2004), the Oran Mor Pipe Band (2005-2013) and the Stuart Highlanders Pipe Band (2013-2015) he has spent the last three seasons as a fly-in player with the Inveraray and District Pipe Band. In these three seasons, he has been present with the band for five 2nd Place finishes at major championships including the World Pipe Band Championships in 2016 and 2018, and four major championship wins including the band's victory at the World Pipe Band Championships in 2017. Since 2017, he has also been actively instructing the Grade Three Ulster Scottish Pipe Band and has recently stepped into the role of pipe major.

Eric is thrilled to have been asked to sit on this year's judging panel for the Nicol-Brown Invitational with his former instructor, Nancy Tunnicliffe. He would like to wish all of the competitors the best of luck on the day, and more importantly, to enjoy every minute of an event which has proven to be a watershed moment for so many of the world's top pipers today.

The Competitors

ALISTAIR BEVAN Abbotsford, British Columbia

Alistair turned 16 years old in September, and is enrolled in the honours program at Yale Secondary School in Abbotsford, British Columbia. He began piping at the age of 7 under the tutelage of his parents, Bonnie and Alan Bevan. Alistair was a member of the Robert Malcolm Memorial Pipe Band for six years, competing at the World Pipe Band Championships with the band in 2014 and 2017. In September 2017, he was invited to join the Simon Fraser University Pipe Band and has enjoyed competing with the band over the past season. Alistair won the BC Pipers' Association Grand Aggregate in Grades

5, 4 and 3. He won the Grade 1 Grand Aggregate in 2017, his first year in the class, and again this year in 2018. In 2017, Alistair was the overall winner of both the Nicol-Brown and the George Sherriff Memorial Invitational. He has attended Piping Hot Summer Drummer (PHSD) every year since he started piping. He has won the PHSD tune writing competition five times and placed 2nd twice. This summer, Alistair competed around the games in Scotland and placed 3rd in the intermediate N

games in Scotland and placed 3rd in the intermediate MSR at the Argyllshire Gathering. Alistair is excited to have been invited back to compete at the Nicol-Brown again this year.

KEVIN DARMADI Houston, Texas

Kevin is a 16-year-old high school Jr. at St. Thomas' Episcopal School in Houston, Texas. This is his eighth year piping under instructors Lyric Todkill, Nick Hudson and Mike Cusack. He is currently pipe sergeant of the St. Thomas Episcopal School Pipe Band, recently winning the Grade 3 contest at the 2017 and 2018 American Pipe Band Championships in Norfolk, Virginia. He also plays with the Grade 2 St. Thomas Alumni Pipe Band, winning 2nd in Grade 2 at the 2018 World Pipe Band Championships in Glasgow, Scotland.

This season was a successful season for Kevin. As of late September, he was ranked 1st overall in the EUSPBA in Grade 1 for both Light Music and Piobaireachd. He won Grade 1 Piper of the Day prizes this year at the Loch Norman Highland Games and the Capital District Highland Games. He earned 2nd overall at the 2018 Metro Cup Invitational Amateur contest in Newark, New Jersey, getting 2nd in Piobaireachd and 3rd in the MSR. He also won the overall amateur prize at the 2018 United States Piping Foundation Championships in Newark, Delaware by getting 1st in the Piobaireachd and 3rd in the MSR. This is his first year to be invited to both the Nicol-Brown and George Sherriff competitions.

KENNETH GARSON Ottawa, Ontario

Ken began piping at the age of 12, under the instruction of Jock Stewart from St. Albert, Ontario. Ken was introduced to piobaireachd in 1975 at a summer school led by Jimmy

McIntosh of Anderson, South Carolina. There he met his future wife Amy who peaked his interest in attending summer piping schools in Timmins, Ontario and later in Edinboro, Pennsylvania under Jimmy's instruction.

At the end of the 1984 competition season, Ken put his pipes down due to educational commitments. Ken competed one last time, finding success at the Nicol-Brown contest in the spring of 1985. With his passion for medical research consuming much of his free time, Ken did not return to piping until 2015, 30 years later.

Coming out of retirement, Ken was successful at winning the piobaireachd contest at the Ottawa Branch Indoor Games in the spring of 2016. This gave him the dubious honour

of being undefeated in Grade 1 piobaireachd over a 31 year span. Returning to piping has been a joy for Ken, although returning to competition has been challenging. Ken was delighted to win the Amateur Grade 1 Piper of the Day at the New Hampshire Highland Games in 2018 and is honoured to be competing at the Nicol-Brown contest after a 33-year hiatus.

JOSEPH HORWATH Saginaw, Michigan

Joey is 18 years old and a senior at Heritage High School. He began bagpiping in 2006 at the age of 6, but he did not start competing until 2013. His first teacher was Bob Pennington and shortly after that he moved on to take lessons with Dennis Lowe. He currently takes instruction from various teachers as well as at Alma College. Along with helping out the Alma College Pipe Band, he also plays with the Grade 2 Great Lakes Pipe Band from Cleveland, Ohio.

Over the past five years, Joey has competed in MWPBA, EUSPBA, PPBSO and WUSPBA-sanctioned games. He has placed in the top three in several events in each association, including the North American Championships. This summer, Joey was the Amateur Piper of the Day at the Pleasanton Highland Games in California and the Alma Highland Festival in Michigan. He placed 2nd at Winter Storm in Missouri, and was the overall winner at the Balmoral Classic in Pennsylvania. This summer, Joey competed at the Pipe Idol event at the Piping Live festival in Glasgow, Scotland.

Joey has attended the Ohio Scottish Arts School since 2015 where he has received instruction from Stephen MacNeil, Barry Conway, Andrew Duncan and Craig Munro.

TORI KILLORAN Pitt Meadows, British Columbia

Tori is a Criminology student at Simon Fraser University in Burnaby, British Columbia. She started piping at the age of 9 under the instruction of Scot Kortegaard and later Edmund Chilton. Currently, Tori receives instruction from Jack Lee. The Kamloops Pipe Band Society was the first band that Tori played with, and in 2011 she joined the Robert Malcolm

Memorial (RMM) Pipe Band. She played in the RMM organization until 2015, when she was promoted to the SFU Pipe Band. One highlight in Tori's piping career has been playing at the Glasgow Concert Hall for the Pre-World's Concert in 2015. Tori is also a competitive highland dancer who has represented British Columbia at the Canadian Highland Dancing Championships four times. One of the highlights of Tori's dancing career was being a part of the 2014 Royal Edinburgh Military Tattoo Highland Dance Team. Tori enjoys sharing her passion of the Scottish Arts with her piping and dancing students. When she isn't piping, dancing, or studying, she enjoys hiking, biking and camping.

GAVIN MACKAY Kitchener, Ontario

Gavin is a 17-year-old high school student in Grade 12 at Cameron Heights Collegiate in Kitchener, Ontario. He started piping at the age of 10 under the expert guidance of Gail Brown, Ed Neigh, and more recently, Jim McGillivray. Gavin comes from a family of pipers, as his two aunts, Angela (1993) and Lynda (1999), and his father, Andrew (2013), have all previously competed at the Nicol-Brown.

This season, Gavin was the overall winner of the Grade 1 circuit in Ontario, placing 1st in Light Music and 2nd in Piobaireachd. He is currently a member of the Grade 1 Toronto Police Pipe Band, which is full of great players and great people, with P/M Sean McKeown and P/S Ian K. MacDonald providing their expert advice.

Gavin wants to thank his grandparents, Susan and Mike Mackay at Ben Bhraggie House, for everything they contribute to his piping and all of his immediate and extended family for their constant support, encouragement and for always providing the biggest cheering section. Finally, thanks to the PPBSO for their continued support.

CHARLIE MORRIS Agoura Hills, California

Charlie is currently pursuing a degree in Education. At a young age, he learned the importance of having teachers who are passionate about their craft and connected to their students, inspiring each to achieve their best. He has been blessed to have not only a teacher, but a friend in his bagpipe teacher, Seumas Coyne. He hopes to one day teach both elementary school and bagpipes.

Charlie has played with the Grade 3 Robert Malcolm Memorial and Grade 2 Los Angeles Scots Pipe Bands, competing at the World Pipe Band Championships with each. This year's solo highlights include: World Solo Amateur Championship (CLASP)—2nd in MSR; North American Amateur Piobaireachd Championship Grade 1—2nd; and 1st Overall (as of September 2018) in both Piobaireachd and Light Music in the Grade 1 WUSPBA Season Aggregate.

BRANNAGH O'DONNELL Assonet, Massachusetts

Brannagh is a first-year Business student at Trinity Western University, who started piping at the age of 10 under her grandfather. Since then, Brannagh has taken lessons from various instructors and now studies under Jack Lee. At age 14, she joined the Worcester Kiltie Pipe Band, and currently plays with them in the Grade 2 arena.

As a soloist, Brannagh has had a successful season, and has received various prizes including a 1st Place 2/4 March prize at Maxville. Brannagh is currently ranked as the highest aggregate Grade 1 competitor in the Northeast branch of EUSPBA and as of September, 2nd in the EUSPBA Grade 1 overall season standings. This is Brannagh's second opportunity to compete in the Nicol-Brown and she is grateful and excited to play in the contest. Brannagh would like to thank her family for their constant support.

ALEXANDER SETO Aurora, Ontario

Alexander is a recent graduate from Western University, and is currently pursuing a Master's in Psychology. He began learning the pipes when he was 12 years old at a local independent school, St. Andrew's College, under the tutelage of Ellen Mole and Jim McGillivray. Alexander continued to play and progress within this band and eventually became pipe major in his senior year of high school.

Alexander currently competes in the PPBSO circuit and has been in Grade 1 since 2013. He missed last year's season due to studying and traveling abroad in Australia, but was eager to get back into the piping scene this year. This past season, Alexander finished in 2nd place in the combined Champion Supreme standings for Grade 1 Light Music and Senior Amateur Piobaireachd. He was

fortunate enough to be named Amateur Piper of the Day at the Cobourg, Maxville and Almonte Highland Games.

Alexander would like to thank Ellen and Jim for their guidance and instruction, and also give a huge thanks to his parents and brother for their ongoing support and endless hours put in by them to help him succeed.

FILEMON TAN Bellaire, Texas

Filemon is Pipe Major of the St. Thomas Episcopal School "A" Band. He received First Place in both 2018 Grade 1 events at Winter Storm in Kansas City, Missouri, and 1st Place in the Grade 1 MSR at the 2018 U.S. Piping Foundation Championships in Newark, Delaware. In Scotland this year, Filemon got 2nd in the Grade 2 World Pipe Band Championships with the St. Thomas Alumni Band and a 4th and 5th in Juvenile solos at the Cowal Highland Gathering. History

In recognition of the continuing development of piping standards in North America, Donald F. Lindsay and students from Williams College in Massachusetts established the First Annual Williams College Amateur Invitational Piobaireachd, where the Nicol-Brown Chalice was first presented on April 2, 1982. This special event was dedicated to Robert Brown and Robert Nicol ("The Bobs of Balmoral") who shared a deep and abiding enthusiasm for Piobaireachd. It was out of their affiliation with John MacDonald of Inverness that their life-long commitment to the teaching and perpetuation of Ceol Mor grew. As musicians and as world citizens, their lives remain an inspiration to pipers everywhere. It is upon the shoulders of these great teachers and Piobaireachd authorities that today's pipers and instructors stand.

Modeled after Scotland's Oban and Inverness competitions, the "Olympics of Piping," the Nicol-Brown Invitational Contest provides enthusiastic top amateur pipers with a prestigious competition which sets a standard by which to judge their piping, and a goal to direct their hours of practice. Piobaireachd, or classical pipe music, does not always get a fair hearing due to the length, difficulty and intricacy of the tunes, but this invitational contest has become a respected place to play and listen to Piobaireachd in the United States. In order to encourage Piobaireachd of the highest standards, the top amateur Piobaireachd players from across the North American continent have been invited to compete. All competitors selected for the Nicol-Brown must be ranked at the top amateur level for both Piobaireachd and Light Music by their home associations, and must have significant results in the current season.

The Nicol-Brown has pioneered the way for elite invitational events for amateur pipers. Many former competitors and their family members return each year to volunteer their time to continue the traditions of the Nicol-Brown — a testimony to the influence that the contest has had on the lives of so many pipers.

In 1982, Brian Yates, an American piper and silversmith, was commissioned to craft the Nicol-Brown Chalice, with the winning Piobaireachd competitor's name to be inscribed on the base each year. Brian has described the Chalice project as a "cathedral" which would take years to complete. Stephen Walker of Walker Metalsmiths has volunteered many hours of his artistic skills to bring the cathedral closer to completion.

In 1987, the Nicol-Brown committee added a March, Strathspey and Reel contest, and commissioned Mr. Fred Graham, Scottish Celtic Armourer and Silversmith of the "Royal Mile" in Edinburgh, to make a targe in honor of P/M William Ross. The MSR winner's name is inscribed on the targe each year, along with the tunes played in the winning performance.

In 1990, a 6/8 March contest was added in honor of Donald MacLeod, with a silver buckle designed by Brian Yates to be awarded each year. In 2007, Stephen Walker designed a new edition of the buckle, to be awarded for the twelfth time this year. He has done considerable research on a technique to create "chip-carving" which is how he believes many of the early medieval masterpieces of Celtic metalwork were fashioned. The

method seems to have been lost about a thousand years ago, and Stephen is working on a revival.

The overall Nicol-Brown champion for 2018 will win up to \$750 in travel expenses to compete in the Scottish Piping Society of London competitions in November 2019, or another major competition in 2019 to be approved by the Nicol-Brown committee. Bob Brown and Bob Nicol featured prominently in the prize lists in London, and we have been proud to connect our contest to that history since 1998. Bob Brown won the Open Piobaireachd (now called the Gillies Cup) 12 times and the Bratach Gorm (for Former Winners) three times. His last win in London was in November 1971, just before he passed away in the spring of 1972.



Inspired by the Ardagh Chalice, c. 800-899 AD, the Nicol-Brown Chalice was designed and created by Brian Yates as a symbol of the pursuit of excellence in Celtic art and music. Stephen Walker of Walker Metalsmiths has added his artistry to the chalice, and it is a masterpiece.

ROBERT URQUHART BROWN

Bob Brown was born in 1906 in Banchory, Scotland, of a family which had long shown a keen interest in all the music of Scotland. He received his first instruction on the bagpipes from William Fraser, a pupil of G.S. McLennan, who although suffering from a physical handicap acquired during the First World War, was still considered a fine player. Next, the young Brown went to Jonathan Ewen, an Inverness Medalist, who began for him his life-long study of Ceol Mor. Ewen was a pupil of Sandy Cameron, so it was not surprising that his young pupil began to win a number of competitions in his local area. This brought him to the attention of G.S. Allan, who took him under his wing and accompanied



him to the Argyllshire Gathering in 1925, where Brown won the junior piobaireachd. The following year he was unplaced but highly commended in the Gold Medal event.

Although he was a keen competitor and loved the excitement of the boards, Bob Brown did not always find it easy to get time off from his work—which is surprising in view of the fact that his employers have always been enthusiasts for piping. It was in fact 1931 before he was able to return to Oban, and this time he won the Gold Medal. By then, however, he was the holder of the Inverness Medal, which he won in

1928. This was also the year when, according to Bob, there occurred the most important event in his piping life—he began to take lessons from John MacDonald. "I owe my knowledge," said Bob Brown once, "to John MacDonald who made me the piobaireachd enthusiast that I am." Certainly, it is partly through his long and close association with John MacDonald that he came to be looked on as a great authority, but this was also due to his own clear and reasoned expositions on this subject, and his unfailing ability to produce great music whenever he played.

His fame and standing increased as time went on. In the last decade of his life, pipers began beating a path to the door of his cottage at Balmoral and he began taking his knowledge to different parts of the world. For several years he was the instructor at the Invermark summer schools in New York state; he visited South Africa and New Zealand; and it was while he was in Australia in 1972 that the first signs came of the ailment which was to prove so quickly fatal. He was barely able to get home to his beloved Scotland before he passed away.

ROBERT BELL NICOL

Bob Nicol was born in 1905 in Durris, Aberdeenshire, and was first taught by a piper MacKellar, a pupil of MacDougall Gillies, who was later killed in the 1914-18 war. He was then taught by one of the Ewen brothers. Another of the brothers, Jonathan Ewen, at that time was teaching the young Bob Brown who was later to become Bob Nicol's life-long friend. Bob Nicol had a successful junior career and his first piping appointment was as piper to Lord Cowdray at Dunecht. It was from here that he moved to Balmoral as King George V's piper in 1924. In 1926, when only 20 years old he had a shooting accident that resulted in the loss of his right eye. A shot from a fellow gamekeeper ricocheted off a frozen tree and hit him in the eye.

Later in 1926, King George V was anxious to have Bob given the best tuition and he consulted the factor at Balmoral, Sir Douglas Ramsay,

and Sheriff Grant, Rothiemurchus, who were both pupils of John MacDonald. As a result, Bob Nicol was sent to Inverness to study with John MacDonald for a month that same year. It was a nerve-wracking time, as Bob related, "When John MacDonald came into the room he gave me a good dressing-down for a start. He said, 'You're no use to me.' In fact he was quite nasty to me for the whole month." But on the

completion of his course a very good report was sent to Balmoral. The following year he was accompanied by Bob Brown, and the visits continued every year until 1939.

During this period, Bob Nicol became one of the outstanding players, winning all the top honours including the Gold Medal at Inverness and Oban in 1930 and the Clasp in 1932. His medal tune at Inverness was "Lament for Donald Ban MacCrimmon," a tune he was later to play at the graveside of



both John MacDonald and Bob Brown. Throughout the 1939-45 war he served as pipe major in the 2nd Gordons and ran a piobaireachd class for the 15th Scottish Division. He also taught at schools in America and Brittany. He was a very good and firm teacher, a likeable man with a sharp wit and sense of humour. Dedicated to keeping the traditional piobaireachd alive, he was undoubtedly one of the greats and one of the most knowledgeable men of our time. Bob Nicol died in 1978.

PIPE MAJOR WILLIAM ROSS

Pipe Major William Ross (1879-1965) learned his early piping from his father, mother, and his uncle, Aeneas Ross, who guided his early steps in Piobaireachd. By his own great musical ability, Pipe Major Ross rose to the top of his profession. Music flowed from William Ross's pipe and fingers with no apparent effort: "the mighty frame seemed hardly to need to blow". It was the simplicity of the true expert—like the golf swing of a master—making it look easy until we try to do it ourselves. Unlike so many pipers, success never spoiled him, and if ever one needed



a tonic, an hour in the company of the illustrious Pipe Major would assure a cure for the ailment. He was peerless in conversation, a Prince of Storytellers. He loved human beings and was loved by them in return. In his life and work, Willie Ross was a delightful example of the perfect gentleman. By his courtesy, his modesty, and his professional ability, he left an indelible, honoured name that will live down through the ages and cheer the hearts of those who listen to the recordings of his lovely music.

He joined the Scots Guards in 1896 and from that date until his retirement in 1957 he served piping and pipers. In 1920 he was appointed Principal of the

new Army School of Piping at Edinburgh Castle. After his retirement from the Army, it was in 1921 that he became the Piobaireachd Society's tutor, and through his appointment, pipers both military and civilian

were able to benefit from his tuition. His pupils are scattered throughout the world and always provided the cream of the piping world with many champions amongst them. The world of pipers has not only been made up of players, teachers, and composers; there have been those who worked to make the music of the pipe available to the piper, and those who worked to ensure that the great heritage was passed on. William Ross's collection of pipe music remains the mainstay and guide of many pipers.

DONALD MACLEOD

Donald MacLeod was born in Stornoway on the Isle of Lewis on August 14, 1916. His first piping lessons were from his father, and at the age of six he came into contact with Pipe Major Willie Ross, who travelled to the Hebrides on behalf of the Piobaireachd Society. At age 11, Donald had his first lessons with John MacDonald of Inverness, and that relationship lasted for 25 years.

MacLeod joined the Seaforth Highlanders in 1937, and in 1939 went to France with the 2nd Battalion. He was taken prisoner at St. Valery, but escaped, and made his way back across Europe to re-join his regiment. MacLeod was made pipe major in 1941, and in 1944 returned to the front, where he piped his regiment across the Rhine during the last campaign of the war. Following the war, MacLeod spent a number of years at Fort George, where he tutored young pipers in the British Army.

Few competitors have won as many prizes as Donald MacLeod. He won the Gold Medal at Inverness in 1947, and added eight Clasps between 1948 and 64. He won the Open Piobaireachd at Oban three times, and six Silver Stars for the Former Winners' MSR at Inverness. In 1959, Donald MacLeod competed only at Oban and Inverness. Of the seven events he entered, MacLeod won six first prizes, and was unplaced in the 7th event!

Donald MacLeod owned the bagpipe firm of Grainger & Campbell after leaving the army, and during those years he travelled around the world to



teach and perform. He also was among the first to use recorded lessons for teaching piobaireachd, and he sent tapes to pipers around the world. Those original tapes are now being released in a comprehensive CD series available to all pipers.

MacLeod was a prolific composer with six books of light music, plus a collection of piobaireachd. Many of the tunes collected, composed and arranged for his 7th and 8th books of light music were published by the Gordon Highlanders after his death in 1982. His tunes are standard fare of both bands and soloists, and they are heard wherever the Highland bagpipe is played.

Donald MacLeod left many recordings of himself through years of BBC radio programs and solo records. After he had retired from competition he was heard on two excellent recordings, "The Piper in the Nave" and "The Piper's Ceilidh." Donald MacLeod was awarded the M.B.E. for his services to piping.
